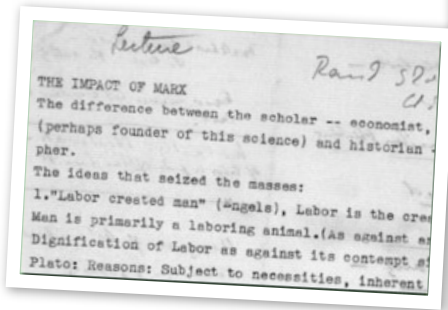

“Why Arendt Matters”

In this lecture Elisabeth Young-Bruehl will present key concepts from three of Hannah Arendt’s seminal works: *The Origins of Totalitarianism* (1951), *The Human Condition* (1958), and *The Life of the Mind* (posthumously published in 1978). She will consider how these concepts can be useful and illuminating to us now, in 2006, which is the centenary of Arendt’s birth.

Elisabeth Young-Bruehl published her prize-winning biography *Hannah Arendt: For Love of the World* in 1982. Her *Anna Freud: A Biography* appeared in 1988, and since then she has published *Creative Characters*, *Freud on Women*, *The Anatomy of Prejudices*, *Cheerishment*, and three essay collections. She is a psychoanalyst in Manhattan and on the faculty of the Columbia Center for Psychoanalytic Training and Research.
